<u> Library News!</u>

We are always so grateful for books donated to our Library. Here are two, given to us recently, on the relationship between work and faith:

Visions of Vocation by Steven Garber, head of the Washington Institute for Faith, Vocation & Culture. Garber, a consultant, teacher and public speaker, presents a series of vignettes -- from encounters with a wide range of people -- to illustrate why a vocation is much more than a job. A Christianity Today Books & Culture review says the author "causes readers to think about their lives in new and challenging ways, exploring questions which, when answered in good conscience, comprise a fabric of faithfulness." The institute, which Garber founded, defines vocation as "one's entire life lived in response to God's call." This is his third book.

Work Matters – Connecting Sunday Worship to Monday Work by *Tom Nelson*, senior pastor of *Christ Community Church* in Leawood, Kansas. Nelson writes that *all* honest work is sacred, that God sees our jobs as ministry, no matter what we do for a living. He emphasizes that ordinary jobs can be done in an extraordinary manner and suggests how we can find fulfillment in work that seems like drudgery. Readers have used such terms as *practical*, *insightful and common sense* in reviews of this book. Its publisher, *Crossway*, says Nelson offers "a new perspective on work that will transform your workday and make the majority of your waking hours matter, not only now, but for eternity."



What does the Lord require of you? by Gloria Stephan

The morning after returning from the Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference in Grove City, I heard the news about the violent killings in Orlando. Bishop Bickerton's opening session to clergy and laity of our district focused on words from the minor prophet Micah. These words were still on my mind when he repeated them again in a written statement in response to the shootings.

"Do Justice, Love Kindness, and Walk Humbly with Your God" Micah 6:8

This is the requirement of God. Was this somehow easier last week than next week in the face of yet another senseless loss of life? Does it really matter that we are called to transform the world? Can one person, or two van loads of volunteers really make a difference? How about 16,267 volunteers from 33 states last year working to eradicate substandard living conditions in Central Appalachia? Can we trust that all we must do is simply what God requires of us? To do, to love, to walk, to plant the seed and allow God to do the rest?

Yes, I think so. I have seen the seeds planted by my church that have grown into former First Bethel youth serving as adult Group Leaders and as full-time ASP staff. I have seen ASP volunteers love unconditionally and give of their time and talents to provide warmer, safer, drier homes for God's children.

The Bishop encouraged us to do justice by committing ourselves to loving our neighbor and working on their behalf to ensure safety, health, blessings, and value. Loving

kindness can change things after all because love always wins. And walking humbly means we don't always have adequate words or actions, but that we continue to walk with God anyway.

Remember God is ahead to show us the way, behind to encourage, above to watch over, beneath to sustain, beside as friend, and within to grant us peace. Let's keep walking.
