MONTHLY NEWSLETTER THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR DAVID



Amongst the many stories of personal transformation in the Bible, if one needs to guess, or go to a 'default' time, there is a common number. Forty. Forty seems to be the 'default' time God uses to transform those God has allowed to endure trial.

In the opening stories of the Bible, we read of Noah's family and the gathered animals in the ark for forty days. This period provided a time for Noah & family to experience God's judgement, grace, and restoration. After Moses killed the Egyptian abusing his fellow Israelite, Moses fled to the desert for forty days to escape certain death. Later in his life, Moses retreated on Mount Sinai for forty days, interceding for Israel's survival before God. The Israelites wandered the desert for forty years. Goliath taunted Israel's army forty days before David killed him. In the New Testament, we see Jesus tempted forty days in the desert before beginning his public ministry. And there were forty days after Jesus' resurrection and his ascension.

We are in the midst of the period of Lent...a period of forty days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. We look to be transformed during this period of time...in all the ways those mentioned above would have been transformed. Perhaps these words from our United Methodist Book of Worship can assist us in positioning ourselves for transformation.



This is the *Invitation to the Observation of Lenten Discipline*:

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ: the early Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church that before the Easter celebration there should be a forty-day season of spiritual preparation.

During this season converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when persons who had committed serious sins and had separated themselves from the community of faith were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to participation in the life of the Church.

In this way the whole congregation was reminded of the mercy and forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel of Jesus Christ and the need we all have to renew our faith. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to observe a holy Lent: by self—examination and repentance;

by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word.

To make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now kneel (bow) before our Creator and Redeemer.

May our hearts be transformed, that our readiness for the celebration of Easter may be primed and ready to overflow with gladness and joy! That's what coming "From the Heart" this month friends! May God be with us as we continue journeying together!

Dear First Bethel,



On Monday, February 19, we held our first council meeting since we informed you of the near-term financial shortfall our church is facing. We know you are eager for an update.

At the January congregational meeting, you learned that the council is working to cut costs and develop new, sustainable revenue sources. We asked you to direct your offerings to the General Fund, and to prayerfully ask God what you, as a member of His Church, could do. We are happy to report that we have made some progress.

- On cost-cutting measures: Our efforts to reduce expenses appear to be working to decrease a small part of the expected shortfall. We've also shifted money from a few small inactive funds to the General Fund and note that a number of you have redirected your offerings there too. Thank you. If you haven't yet taken this step, please consider doing so.
- On the revenue side: Our Kings School Kids team is working diligently to iron out staffing issues so they can expand enrollment and improve revenues. They've made some progress over the last month, but it's too soon to put numbers to it. We hope to be able to do so after the first quarter. We are happy to report that the pledges for giving are higher this year and could possibly shave another 5% or so from the shortfall when they are honored. Thank you.
- On new work and ministries: Members of the church and your elected leadership met in January to establish initial goals for 2024 that are fitting and appropriate for First Bethel and to align them with both existing and new church work. A tool has been purchased to help our leadership imagine and design new ways to use our property and buildings for God's ministry and to help make up the rest of the shortfall. This effort is starting in March

What can you do now? To help connect you with this work, and make it yours, we are holding a Spiritual Gifts Fair on Sunday, March 10, at 10:30AM after church in the narthex. We urge you to come to this fair with an open heart. Please, come pray with us and find the area where God wants you to serve, so we can work together to shape First Bethel's future. We can't do this without you.

I'll share my results below:

- Teaching the gift of bringing scriptural and spiritual truths to others. More than just teaching Christian education classes, teachers witness to the truth of Jesus Christ in a variety of ways, and they help others to understand the complex realities of the Christian faith. Teachers are revealers. They shine the light of understanding into the darkness of doubt and ignorance. They open people to new truths, and they challenge people to be more in the future than they have been in the past.
- Compassion the gift of exceptional empathy with those in need that moves us to action. More than just concern, compassion demands that we share the suffering of others in order to connect the gospel truth with other realities of life. Compassion moves us beyond our comfort zones to offer practical, tangible aid to all God's children, regardless of the worthiness of the recipients or the response we receive for our service.
- Knowledge the gift of knowing the truth through faithful study of Scripture and the human situation. Knowledge provides the information necessary for the transformation of the world and the formation of the body of Christ. Those possessing the gift of knowledge challenge the fellowship to improve itself through study, reading of Scripture, discussion, and prayer.

Now I am asking you to look at yourselves. What are your Spiritual Gifts? How can you apply them here inside and outside the walls of First Bethel? I'll tell you how! We're having a Spiritual Gifts Fair in the Narthex on Sunday, March 10 after church. There will be representatives from every leadership committee, supportive committee and social group that operates within First Bethel. It is my hope that you will stop by and see what is offered, put your name down, and continue to become plugged in to life at First Bethel by sharing YOUR spiritual gifts with all of us.

FIRST BETHEL UMC MINISTRY GOALS FOR 2024

Time has moved quickly since the first meeting in December to discuss and prayerfully consider what First Bethel's goals and objectives might be. The goals have since been refined, approved by Council, and sent to our District Superintendent.

Our church's organizational structure is divided into two main elements - Administrative and Ministry. The Ministry element is outlined by Nurture, Outreach and Witness (NOW).

Each goal has metrics and measurements, which will help us to see how we're doing. Call the Church Office if you want a copy of the details. Below is a *condensed* summary of those goals

NURTURE GOALS (includes education, worship, Christian formation, membership care, small groups, stewardship, and more)

- 1. Increase congregational involvement in administrative and program ministries.
- 2. Grow Youth Ministry
- 3. Improve Intra (inside) Church Communications

OUTREACH GOALS (attention to local, regional and global ministries of compassion, justice and advocacy)

- 1. Grow Parkford Apartment Outreach
- 2. Maintain Current Outreach: ASP, Daily Bread, Angel Tree, Prayer Quilts, The Nyadire Connection, etc.

WITNESS GOALS (developing and strengthening evangelistic efforts of Christian experience, faith and service)

- 1. Increase extra-church (outside) communication
- 2. Increase engagement with neighboring businesses and our community
- 3. Renew the ministry of First Bethel Ambassadors who are scheduled and available on Sunday mornings
- 4. Discern & develop new revenue-bearing ministry

DO YOU HAVE A KEY FOB?

building during off hours, you MUST convert to the new system now. The old system will be uninstalled by March 17th, after which the old key fobs will no longer work!

You can also make payments online via Vanco, select "Other Designated" and put "Easter Flowers" in the text field.


The flowers are yours to take after the Easter Sunday worship service.

In this work of historical fiction, male editors discarded "female-oriented" words while creating the *Oxford English Dictionary*. A girl named *Esme*, whose father worked on the dictionary, saved the "lost words," with help from her friend Lizzie, a family servant. The

story, set during the height of the women's suffrage movement, has been described as a "love-letter to words." The author is *Pip Williams*.

FLASH: The Homeless Donkey Who Taught Me About Life, Faith and Second Chances.

This memoir by Texas author/artist *Rachel Anne Ridge* tells us how she learned from Flash after giving him a home. The *Chicago Tribune* said their story "may make you adopt a donkey of your own."

BOOK CLUB


Book Club meets on the third Friday of the month at 7PM at Panera Bread in South Park Shops.

March 15 Salvage the Bones by Jesmyn Ward



A hurricane is building over the Gulf of Mexico, threatening the coastal town of Bois Sauvage, Mississippi, and Esch's father is growing concerned. A hard drinker, largely absent, he doesn't show concern for much else. Esch and her three brothers are stocking food, but there isn't much to save. Lately, Esch can't keep down what food she gets; she's fourteen and pregnant. Her brother Skeetah is sneaking

scraps for his prized pit bull's new litter, dying one by one in the dirt. Meanwhile, brothers Randall and Junior try to stake their claim in a family long on child's play and short on parenting.

As the twelve days that make up the novel's framework yield to their dramatic conclusion, this unforgettable family--motherless children sacrificing for one another as they can, protecting and nurturing where love is scarce--pulls itself up to face another day. A big-hearted novel about familial love and community against all odds, and a wrenching look at the lonesome, brutal, and restrictive realities of rural poverty, *Salvage the Bones* is muscled with poetry, revelatory, and real.
